On the 20th September while on holiday in Holland.


Ron's affection for the School and the Association was no passing thing.



Ted Parrish's ECHOES OF OLD WATFORD, BUSHEY & OXHEY



Nearly 60 people attended the launch of Ted Parrish's ***Echoes of Old Watford, Bushey & Oxhey***, including Mayor Dorothy Thornhill, three former Mayors of Watford and members of organisations with which he was involved, including the RAFA, the Oxhey Village Environment Group, the Kings Jazz Club and Watford Cine Society.

In the early 1980s, the former Old Fullarian wrote a fascinating series of 96 local history articles entitled ***Ted Parrish Remembers*** for the ***Evening Post-Echo***. The nostalgic articles covered many aspects of life in the area in past decades, including entertainment, transportation, education, VIP and Royal visits, housing, policing, politics and the coming of war.

Ted's daughter, Lesley Dunlop, has edited and published the complete series of articles, adding well over 200 illustrations, including maps, readers' letters and footnotes.

HAPPY Birthday to me, 49 today. Although it's definitely 27 June 2012, I am jet lagged and hardly know what day of the week it is.

In the Melbourne suburb of South Yarra, a 10-minute rattle away from the central business district by tram, I am having lunch with Olympic middle distance legend Steve Ovett.

Although he famously, er, kept his distance from Her Majesty's Press in his heyday on the track, and I have never met him before, Ovett is good-natured and charming with the red-top tabloid reporter who has been sent halfway round the world to sign him up as the Daily Mirror's star columnist for London 2012.

Ovett's rivalry with Lord Sebastian Coe, the chairman of London's Olympic organising committee, made some of the most compelling television of my teenage years. Since then, he has settled in Australia - which is how, four weeks before the curtain goes up on the biggest sporting party Britain has ever thrown, I find myself sat opposite one of our greatest athletes.

Not only do I get on famously with Ovett, but it is a huge source of smugness when I later discover that BBC Radio 5 Live's Colin Murray managed to track down 113 out of 114 living British Olympic gold medallists for his programme Gold Run. Guess who was the only one who eluded him.

In between hours of transcribing interviews and writing them up in my hotel room, I seek inspiration - also known in the print media as intro fuel - in the Elephant and Wheelbarrow pub just across the street.

On the TV in the corner, the Aussies are getting stuffed 4-0 by England in the one-day series, a heavy defeat barely recorded by cheerleaders in the shamelessly jingoistic Oz Press, while at Wimbledon, there are no Australian survivors of the first round singles

draw. Strewth, coppers - if this is the land of the great outdoors, perhaps you'd better stay at home more often.

In some ways, I look back on that five-day trip to Melbourne with as much affection as the London 2012 Games themselves. Ovett turned out to be a perceptive columnist whose predictions were invariably spot-on.

But 2012 was undeniably a sporting year to remember. I had been lucky enough to witness nine of Britain's 19 gold medals in Beijing in 2008; this time, I was there (but did not necessarily write about) 13 of the home nation's stockpile of 29 gold medals, from Bradley Wiggins taking to his throne at Hampton Court after winning the cycling time trial, to Super Saturday, the unprecedented 45 minutes in which Jessica Ennis, Greg Rutherford and Mo Farah delivered a hat-trick of British triumphs in the Olympic stadium.

Former Australian Test captain Steve Waugh, who has encountered the racket which greets Sachin Tendulkar walking to the crease at Eden Gardens, Kolkata, reckons the waves of noise which swept Farah to his 10,000 metres gold medal was the most intense din he had ever encountered in any sporting arena.

Yep, London 2012 was special - although the Games ended on a sad note with the death of my old chum Sid Waddell, the darts commentator whose soundtrack gave pot-bellied men lobbing spears its mysterious appeal.

Where is the Old Fullerian connection in these assorted ramblings, save the author's distant education? Truth be told, there is none - except a careers seminar at the School in September revealed a new generation of motivated undergraduates with aspirations of a career in the media.

They were an impressive bunch. Watch this space...

The Careers Event - Sept 11th 2013

This initial event follows the long since defunct event organised by Sir Frederick Peddler and is in the spirit of the long held practise of assisting boy's careers as established in many top flight schools. The event was held in 6th form common room and on the day we had 24 mentors representing the 10 business sectors as detailed below. 48 boys attended.

Martin kicked off and Russell Deane spoke as outlined below.



Mentors hosted group sessions on their sector and the boys were given an opportunity to visit two rounds.

This was followed up with 1:1 sessions based on mentor feedback once the boys had presented themselves in an interview type scenario.

Feedback has been excellent from both boys and mentors.

Thanks must go to Effie, Martin, the mentors and the boys.

Russell Deane introduced himself and the purpose of the event and spoke as follows. He thanked the mentors for giving up their work time and the boys for attending. He described his own experience but stated that today's Career Landscape has changed dramatically:

- *In the current economic times 160 graduates are applying for each job and 40% of grads are still unemployed nine months after leaving University.*
- *Top Independent Schools have very proactive Career Networks.*
- *HR departments. are the gate keepers and they hire very good people who use sophisticated recruitment tools to avoid any form of nepotism!*
- *Finally securing a paid career is now the stuff of Courtship perhaps involving – internships – work placements – summer jobs.....all this needs careful planning and sits at the core of Networking!*

The sectors and hence the mentors were largely selected based on demand from the boys:

- *Sport and Music – two great career opportunities if you would like to make money out of your passion!*
- *Computing – this sector has exploded and we cannot live without them.....*
- *Public Sector – a great training ground for graduates offering long term career opportunities*
- *Construction and Engineering – one of the UK's largest sectors for employment and on a roll as house building remains a priority*
- *Finance and Banking – a troubled sector of late where reputations have been won and lost however good and varied career choice*
- *Consultancy – the darling of the sectors – great learning for grads joining this sector*

- *General Management – leadership and entrepreneurship marks out this sector and there is lots to learn*
- *Journalism – a specialist sector offering great career development and overseas travel*
- *Marketing and Media – another huge employer of personnel in the UK and always at the sharp end of promoting organizations.*
- *Legal Profession – once again specialist with many and varied career paths.*

He explained that following the Career Sector Groups boys would be a designated a Mentor who would spend up to 15 minutes listening to how they



present themselves through their CVs and share feedback on their career thoughts. Boys were encouraged to:

- Introduce themselves to as many of the mentors as is possible during the afternoon and evening.....practise networking skills and make contacts going forward....this is part of a number of connected careers events for the OFA and they may be seeing these mentors on other occasions.
- Pay attention – listen and ask relevant questions – It would be surprising if these mentors did not have the answers and if they did not they would get back..
- Enjoy themselves – *when you are enjoying yourself you LEARN more effectively!*
