Sitting on forms to watch the 1st XI play the MCC at cricket supervised by Foxy Reynolds the Headmaster and a keen cricketer.

Playing football with a tennis ball in the Middle School Quad after school at 4.15pm

Visiting the tuck shop in the old pavilion run by Mrs. Cartwright.

Attending the School Concert held at the end of the Christmas Term.

Parents Day held at the end of the Summer Term.

The Swimming Sports held on the last day of the Summer Term.

Cross Country runs held during the Easter Term. I always came last.

The Munich Crisis in 1938 and the issue of gas masks.

The last summer holiday held in 1939 at Bacton in Norfolk before the war

ARP demonstrations held in Cassiobury Park

Strict discipline at all times, in and out of school and the use of the cane, when necessary - by the Headmaster.

NEWS FROM 'NAM

The good news is that we have survived another Tet attack.

Last week Saigon - sorry, Ho Chi Minh City - was closed, as was the rest of Vietnam. It was Chinese New Year, or Tet, which is a combination of New Year, Christmas and birthdays all rolled into one. In fact, like racehorses, all Vietnamese used to get one year older on New Year's Day, but they celebrate their actual birthdate in this great new Peoples Socialist Republic.

But don't think of this as a grey, uniform example of the old Eastern Europe – that belongs to Ha Noi in the North. Saigon is a vibrant, booming economy equalling most of SE Asia for start-up and trade.



And motorcycles. A population of around 8 million means that there are 10 million motorbikes on the road at any one time.

And then there's the weekly shopping – everything is available, there are supermarkets where the Westerners (all 40,000 of us in Saigon, so I'm told)



buy their cornflakes and Marmite, or there are stalls selling the necessities of life.

I've been out here for most of the past two years, with a few months in Bangladesh just to convince me



that Viet Nam is an unexplored paradise, and expect to be here for at least another couple of years. Besides putting money in the bank, it is a step up from some of my other overseas postings and is well worth visiting between November and March. The rest of the year it rains. And I mean RAINS!!!

Old Fullerians Take on the Old Enemy

When asked to name the best matches between rivals in the world, some might say Liverpool and Manchester United, some "The Ashes" and others the Ryder Cup. Anyone from Watford Grammar knows however that it is the annual school rugby fixture against Merchant Taylor's. When looking back on my school days along with fellow old boy Lenny Brown (1999-2006) our favourite time of every season was making the short trip down to Northwood or welcoming them to the New Field for a game that would always offer some good rugby, refereeing controversy and laughter.

With these memories in mind and the sad absence up until now of a true old boy's side, Lenny took the idea from an Essex Arms conversation and transformed it into a fully fledged plan. Through contacting the Old Merchant Taylor's rugby club, it became apparent that they also wanted to renew this clash of the titans as much as we did and a date was pencilled in for a post-Christmas show-down. Next came the difficulty of recruiting a team that could not only turn up in Old Fullerian colours, but make sure that it was one that tested a team that plays together during the regular season. The mainstay of the team was recruited from years close to ours, with the youngest being a current upper-sixth member, Liam Nicol (2003-2010) and the seasoned campaigner of the side Joe England (1996-2003). In bringing the side together, it became apparent that many of the old boys had gone on to play at a high standard following their schooling in the arts by teachers such as John Williams and Ross Panter. Within the side were players who had represented universities such as Loughborough, Durham, Manchester, Edinburgh and Leeds amongst others upon leaving the school.

Full credit must then go to Lenny who organised almost every other aspect of the game that needed to be arranged, from a referee to a kit for the day. It was decided that we would play at Old Merchant Taylor's Durrant's ground in Croxley Green on December 27th. However, in the week leading up to the game the heavens opened and it looked as though the snow might have put an end to the game. In a testament to the determination and desire for the game to go ahead Lenny and Craig Nicol (1999-2006) went down to the pitch and cleared the snow with brooms to ensure it could go ahead. And so it was that what we hope will become a tradition was started when a team comprising 22 old boys turned up the day after Boxing Day to take on OMTs. On a cold but bright day that was perfect for rugby,

we donned the famous green and black colours.

The game itself was a hotly contested affair with Watford Grammar showing superiority in the scrums and line-outs but OMTs the more cohesive unit in their back play. Having seen a penalty converted by their rivals, the Old Fullerians rallied with a superb break from the youngest member of the side, Liam Nicol, being well recycled, opening up space for Loughborough 1st XV player Rhys Butler (2000-2007) to score in front of the posts. Having gone into half-time leading, the OFs started the secondhalf strongly again dominating in the pack, with halfbacks Craig Foster (2001-2008) and Elliott Birkbeck (2000-2007) kicking well to put us down in the OMT "red-zone." From there a break from Nicol Senior put us within touching distance of the line and Lenny scored a captain's try from a metre out. Having put ourselves in the driving seat, OMTs made their way back into the game with a well-worked try from a cross-field kick. A penalty from Butler kept the score ticking over and a victory looking likely until the last minute. An OMTs break resulted in a try making the score 15-13 to the OFs with no time on the clock. Luckily the fly-half from OMTs missed the kick and the first old boys' fixture was a victory. Following the game Mark Smith (1998-2005) led the post-game social which began in the Standard Tandoori in Croxley Green, a notorious venue over the years for Watford Grammar social events. Donning old school ties and blazers the old boys continued the reunion late into the night with the man of the match award contested between the two England brothers on the basis of who could most quickly consume a pint of lager, with age coming before beauty and Joe England running out a close winner.

Looking to the future, Lenny is hoping to organise future fixtures for the side with a possible game against a St. Alban's old boy's side and a repeat of the OMTs fixture. We were delighted that the first game attracted a crowd of around 100 people with many old boys amongst them and will look to publicise future games for those wanting to come and watch.
